Terry R. Lacy, 75, of Napoleon, Ohio died peacefully on Thursday, October 19, 2023 at his residence with his family by his side. He was born June 5, 1948 in Zanesville, Ohio to the late Edwin and Mary Kay (Robison) Lacy. In 1976, Terry met the love of his life, Diana, and they were married on December 27, 1977.

Terry graduated from Ohio Northern University where he studied education and was a kicker on the football team.
